School Climate Index Report Bridgeport High School

According to the National School Climate Center, school climate refers to the quality and character of school life, and is based on students', parents', and school personnel's experience with the school. It reflects the norms, goals, values, interpersonal relationships, teaching and learning practices, and organizational structures within the school setting.

Although no consensus has been reached about which school climate dimensions are essential, in the context of the Safe and Supportive Schools initiative, school climate has been described in three primary domains:

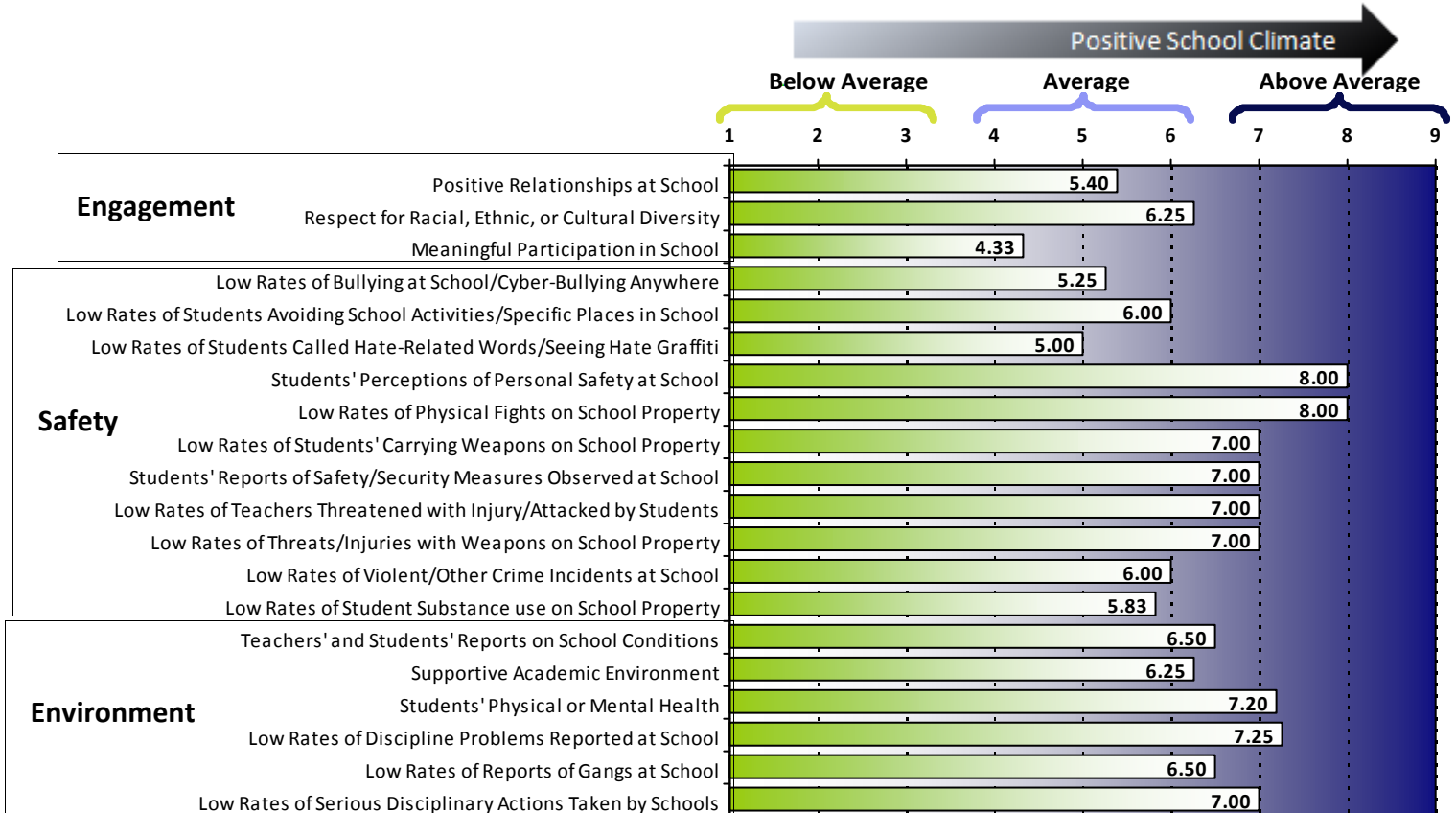
- ENGAGEMENT:** The quality of relationships and interactions among students and staff, respect for diversity in the school environment, and participation in and connectedness to the school community;
- SAFETY:** The physical and emotional safety of the school community, which is influenced by the positive and negative behaviors of students and staff. Also included here are the availability and use of illicit substances in the school setting;
- ENVIRONMENT:** The physical aspects of the school (facilities upkeep, etc.), the academic environment, the availability of physical and mental health supports for students; and the disciplinary tone in the school setting.

In West Virginia, a School Climate Index has been developed using 20 indicators related to the three domains listed above. The indicators were developed from student and staff survey data, as well as discipline data reported into the WV Education Information System (WVEIS). A score was assigned to each indicator for each school on the basis of how the school compared to 42 West Virginia high schools involved in the Safe and Supportive Schools Grant Program. Index scores range from 1 to 9, with 9 representing more positive or desirable school climate conditions.

Index scores can be interpreted as above the average (scores from 7 to 9), about the same as average (scores from 4 to 6), or below the average (scores from 1 to 3) of all the WV schools involved in the S3 grant. Generally, in planning for school improvement priority should be given to indicators with lower scores.

The school climate index scores on each indicator for this school are shown in the chart below. The scores on the twenty indicators were averaged to obtain an overall school climate index score for each school.

PREFACE

This report provides the detailed results provided to parent, guardians and other adult care givers on each question in your 2010-11 administration of the *School Parent Survey* (SPS), presented in tables organized by topic.

This report provides the detailed results for each question from this school/district's 2010–11 *West Virginia School Climate Survey* (WVSCS) of parents, presented in tables organized by topic. This survey is based on the nationally-recognized California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS), one of a suite of student, staff, and parent surveys known as the Healthy Kids School Climate Surveys and adopted and modified by the West Virginia Department of Education for use in its Safe and Supportive Schools (S3) Initiative. To help in understanding and interpreting these results, the *CHKS Guidebook* to survey content discusses the significance of each question. Several other tools to help in data use are also available, as described below.¹

The results of this staff survey should be compared to those obtained from the companion WVSCS surveys of students and staff. Combined, the three surveys provide a comprehensive assessment of the school climate, and the needs and perceptions of key stakeholders within the school community, to guide school improvement efforts.

SURVEY PURPOSE

The purpose for the development of the Healthy Kids survey for students in 1997 by the California Department of Education was to provide data that would assist schools in (1) preventing youth health-risk behaviors and other barriers to academic achievement; (2) promoting positive youth development, resilience, and well-being; and (3) fostering positive school climates and engagement in learning. A thorough understanding of the scope and nature of youth behaviors, attitudes, and learning conditions is essential to guide school improvement efforts and to develop effective prevention, health, and youth development programs. The adoption of this survey by the West Virginia Department of Education for its Safe and Supportive Schools initiative reflects WVDE's commitment to helping schools promote the successful cognitive, social, and emotional development of all students and create more positive, engaging school environments for both students, parents and staff.

THE REPORT

In this Main Report, results are provided in tables with data from the school, county/district and the aggregated data from all the participating high schools in the state .

NEXT STEPS

Receiving this report is a beginning step in the process of using data to improve school climate. The following describes further actions that you can take.

Compare with Other Data Sources

Results from the staff survey will be enriched if analyzed in the context of data from the student and parent school climate survey and other data sources, particularly in the context of identifying consistent patterns or disconnects that need to be further explored. Other data typically collected in effectiveness

studies of school climate include numbers and kinds of discipline referrals, school demographic information, school vandalism costs, and behavioral observations in classrooms.

Discuss the results

Discuss the results with as many audiences as possible to explore the meaning of the results in more depth and to obtain their input into how the school might better meet the needs identified. This is especially important because it communicates to them that you value their input, and it may help improve participation in the next survey.

Conduct Additional Analyses

The dataset enables analyses of patterns in the results, how they are interrelated, and how they vary by different subgroups of staff and across schools within a district.
